**Culture and Race in Social Work Practice-** 2025 Winter Term 2 (January 2026 to April 2026)

Lecture: 3 hours per week delivered in-person

Date/Time: Thursdays, 10:00am-1:00pm

### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Informed by critical cross-cultural and antiracist approaches, this course will provide an overview of issues and approaches inherent in social work scholarship and practice with diverse ethnocultural groups/racialized newcomers within the context of settler Canadian multiculturalism and immigration.

The Sessional Lecturer or Adjunct Professor will be responsible for teaching, holding regular office hours, marking assignments and exams and reporting grades.

### **QUALIFICATIONS**

#### **For appointment as an Adjunct Professor:**

Instructor requirements: M.S.W. or Ph.D. in social work, who are primarily engaged in social work practice or have experience related to social work practice and teaching at the university level.

#### **For appointment as a Sessional Lecturer:**

Instructor requirements: M.S.W. or Ph.D. candidacy in social work who have experience related to social work practice and teaching at the university level.

Sessional Lecturer's salary: Based on the Sessional Lecturer's salary scale as per the UBCFA Collective Agreement.

Adjunct Professor Remuneration: Remuneration is commensurate with experience.

Appointment as an Adjunct Professor does not imply that the appointee has the qualifications necessary for appointment to one of the regular academic ranks.

This position is subject to availability of funds and for Sessional Lecturers will be governed by UBC's "Agreement on Conditions of Appointment for Sessional Faculty Members". Policy AP4 - Faculty Term Appointments applies to Adjunct Professor appointments.
